Autism Spectrum Disorder and Social Communication Disorders

Brief Description:

Social (Pragmatic) Communication Disorder is characterized by persistent difficulties in the social use of verbal and nonverbal communication which results in functional limitations in effective communication, social participation, social relationships, academic achievement, and/or occupational performance.

Autism Spectrum Disorder is characterized by persistent deficits in social communication and social interaction across multiple contexts and the severity is based on social communication impairments and restricted repetitive patterns of behavior.
